October Inspirational Concert Will Raise Money For Programs

ast year it was the talent show. This year we'll present a concert of inspirational music on Sunday, Oct. 24 to raise funds for the Chancel Choir.

Titled "You Raise Me Up: Songs of Hope and Inspiration" the concert will be the choir's only fund raiser for the year.

There will be an orchestra as well as inspirational readings and multimedia. As with past fund raising concerts, choir members will be expected to sell tickets and help with the production.

Money raised from the concert will be used to cover costs of the choir's youth scholarship program, outreach activities and general choir expenses.

Last year, choir officers approved an annual fund raising plan that calls for alternating a talent show with a major concert each fall.

The Chancel Choir will depart for Great Britain on Sunday, June 5, 2005 and return on Tuesday, June 14, 2005.

The tour includes eight nights and 10 days as follows:

- 2 days of travel
- 4 days in London
- 1 day in Stratford-Upon-Avon
- 3 days in Edinburgh

Cost of the tour will be \$2,500 to \$2,600 per person and will include

airline transportation, lodging, two meals a day, guided excursions, feeds and other incidentals. Check the tour information for details.

Although the 82 people already committed to the trip have each paid a \$100 deposit, others wishing to join the tour may still sign up.

Music Celebrations International (MCI) is managing the tour. The company handles travel for the Mormon Tabernacle Choir and other large singing groups.

Attorney Ascends To Throne As Queen of Chancel Choir

With a stern admonition to "do nothing" and a court order to back it up, Joanne Descher was installed as Queen of the Chancel Choir during ceremonies at the end of year party June 19.

The coronation ceremony narrowly averted cancellation when a member of the audience questioned Descher's suitability to be Queen because of her profession. She is an attorney.

After a brief moment of reflection, the Chief Justice reluctantly ruled that Descher could be enthroned with a special oath and other remedies. Although the candidate was hesitant to swear that she was the "trailing spouse" of the choir's president, the ceremony proceeded without interruption.

Descher succeeds Queen Joy Parisien who was thanked for her year on the throne before being defrocked and returned to the crowd as a commoner.

The annual Coronation is conducted by the Royal Court of Chanceldom with the Chief Justice presiding. He was accompanied this year by four agents of the Royal Music Police who provided security and acted as bailiffs for the proceeding. The Royal Herald and a court percussionist provided ceremonial music.


A monthly treasurer's report is provided to the Chancel Choir officers and is available to any member of the choir.



Fall Choir Retreat Returns to Dittmer For Last Time

This year's fall Chancel Choir retreat will return to the Revive Us Again Conference Center in Dittmer, Mo., on Friday and Saturday, Sept. 24 and 25.

The retreat, normally on the first or second weekend in October, is being held earlier this year at the request of the church's historical committee to avoid conflicts with the Chapel Anniversary weekend in



October.

This will be the final year for the Revive Us Again center in Dittmer. Next year, the retreat will return to the Mercy Center in Frontenac where previous retreats have been held. Schedule conflicts at Mercy Center forced the choir to find an alternative location two years ago.

The Chancel Choir literally opened the newly constructed Dittmer Center in 2002 when it was the first group to use the facility.

Format for this year's retreat will be similar to last year, according to Kevin. "It will be the official start to the holiday music rehearsals," he said. "We'll have singing, fun and games as usual."


Rehearsals will begin after dinner on Friday evening. Entertainment and movies will follow later Friday. A full day of rehearsals and recreation is planned for Saturday. The retreat will conclude after dinner on Saturday night.

The Revive Us Again Conference Center is located on Highway 30 (Gravois Road) near the town of Dittmer. Distance to the center from our church is 29 miles. The driving time from the church is approximately 45 minutes.

You can take Highway 141 (or I-270 if you like traffic) to Highway 30 (Gravois) and head southwest. A map is shown above.

Retreat details, such as cost, schedule and registration deadlines, will be announced at the first choir rehearsal on Thursday, Aug. 26.

Santa Didn't Make It This Year


