Chancel Choir Will Perform at Kennedy Center

We're headed to the nation's capitol. The Chancel Choir will sing at Kennedy Center on Saturday, May 24, 2008 during a tour to Washington, D.C. Kevin will direct the Kennedy Center performance of Randall Thompson's *Testament of Freedom* and *Who Are The Brave*. A pre-tour concert will be presented in our Sanctuary on Sunday, May 18.

In addition to the Chancel Choir, the tour is also open to members of Metro Singers, the St. Louis singing

The tour will also include a post concert dinner cruise on the Potomac River, participation in the changing of the wreath at the Tomb of the Unknowns at Arlington National Cemetery on Friday, May 23; worship at the National Cathedral on Sunday, May 25; and the PBS Memorial Day concert on the Capitol steps on Sunday evening, May 25.

We will travel as a group to Washington on Thursday, May 22, and return on Memorial Day, Monday, May 26. We'll stay at the Hilton Washington Hotel located near the Dupont Circle Metro

Last year on a bright October Sunday, four choirs fanned out to Lafayette Park UMC, University City UMC, Centenary UMC and Manchester UMC singing anthems and greeting congregations.

We're doing it again this year on Oct. 14. "It was so successful all of those churches want us back this year," Kevin says. But locations for this year's "visiting choirs" are yet to be worked out.

In each case last year, congregations of the smaller churches were thrilled to have a visiting choir. Most were amazed when told that each group represented about a fourth of the large Chancel Choir at Manchester.

"This is one of the ways our choir can provide a valuable ministry to other churches in the area," Kevin said. "We are blessed with abundance and sharing our talents is part of our outreach programming."

Chancel Choir officers began an outreach program last year. In addition to our Music Ministry Outreach, the choir also has served meals to the homeless in downtown St. Louis at Centenary, and worked to provide money for youth scholarships.


